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CHAIRMAN’S LETTER

During the very successful SRSRA Annual Meeting in April, I pointed out that the good news we expected about “grandfathering” [the protection] of retiree benefits that were promised in December 2006 had not been supported in the Request for Proposal (RFP) issued for the new operating contract at SRS. In fact, the RFP included many of the elements that SRSRA found objectionable in the draft version DOE N 351.1. ... and contained none of the assurances of “protected benefits” we were promised in our meeting with DOE HQ and DOE SROO in December 2006.

On July 19 SRSRA Officers and the Chairman of the Benefits Committee participated in a teleconference with members of the DOE Headquarters and DOE-SR staff. This meeting was a follow on to the meeting on December 6, 2006, which focused on Notice 351.1 –“Contractor Employee Pension and Medical Benefits Policy”. DOE had planned to reissue the Notice in June of 2007. After comments from stakeholders and members of Congress, DOE decided not to reissue the Notice. In the recent teleconference, we had a chance to ask DOE HQ questions about that decision and the responses to our questions and comments on the Request for Proposal for the Management and Operations contract for the Savannah River Site.

The outcome of the meeting was not good. In the meeting on July 19, DOE said that the concept of “grandfathering” retiree pensions and benefits and a commitment of DOE to meet legacy obligations to retirees (which had been an integral part of DOE’s presentation on December 6, 2006) were no longer applicable. **DOE indicated that both “grandfathering” and the commitment to meeting legacy obligations went away with Notice 351.1.** The SRSRA sees no reason why these PROMISES should no longer be honored simply because DOE has elected not to reissue the DOE Order N 351.1. These guarantees have been promised to

SRS workers for nearly 50 years, and DOE 351.1 was simply a key to insure that all these promises were uniformly kept across the DOE complex!

Based on the December 6 meeting, we had requested that grandfathering of retiree benefits be part of the Request for Proposal for the Management and Operations contract for the Savannah River Site. DOE had refused our request. Our pensions and benefits are now to be combined with the pension and benefit programs for active SRS employees and be subject to benefit/value studies, which compare the Savannah River Site contractor benefits to the benefits of other organizations. If the Savannah River Site contractor benefit package is more than 5% above the average of the other organizations, then the new site contractor is obligated to come up with a plan to revise (i.e. reduce) benefits to be in line with the average of the other organizations. DOE has not given any specific guidance on how the new contractor is to revise the benefit plans, but did say that DOE would work with the new contractor on the revisions. How we as retirees would be treated is not clear and **DOE did not agree to let us have input to the process. We argued without success that retiree benefits earned during our working years should not be reduced based on future benefit programs of other organizations designed to attract and retain employees.**

DOE did indicate that, based on past DOE treatment of retirees, we should not be concerned there would be any dramatic reductions in pensions or benefits. Mr. Allison, Manager DOE SROO, also said that the strong support of retirees for Savannah River Site funding and future missions would also make dramatic reductions unlikely. This was good to hear, but not something that we should count on. (see information on page 3 in the excerpt from the meeting minutes, as supplied by DOE, for the July 19 teleconference)

We came away from the meeting more convinced than ever that **we are very dependent on the support and intervention by our congressional delegates.** We will send the minutes of the July 19 meeting to all of the members of our congressional delegation with a cover letter stating our position that the benefits we received at the time of our retirement should be maintained and requesting them to contact DOE on our behalf. We also will be sending members of the SRSRA Board to Washington DC later this fall to meet with members of our congressional delegation and officials at DOE Headquarters to make the same point.

I think that we will be in an ongoing struggle to maintain our pensions and benefits. Your Board is continuing to look at a variety of approaches to maintain your pensions and benefits. The Board and I welcome any suggestions you have for how we should proceed. Also, remember each of you can do your part by remaining a member of the SRSRA and responding to requests to contact your senators and representatives. Our influence with the congressional delegation is affected by the size of our organization. **Your individual letters sent to members of congress do carry a lot of weight!**

DOE Notice N351.1 - DOE Policy, Retiree Pensions and Benefits

The Department of Energy announced that DOE Notice 351.1 has been withdrawn. The subject Notice covered policy changes to pensions and benefits for contractor employees and retirees. The Notice underwent a public comment period of one year.

During the comment period, the DOE sponsored a series of meetings throughout the country held by DOE Director, Office of Management, Ingrid Kolb. The road show appearances were designed to boost support for the DOE's new Pension and Benefit's Policy. During the DOE HQ presentation at the road show, promises were made by Ms. Kolb including statements that the Secretary of Energy backed her words to honor retiree pensions and benefits received by retirees. Specific commitment cutoff dates were included on her slides. Those words and dates never appeared in the proposed policy, Notice 351.1.

As mentioned in the Chairman's Letter, **the withdrawal of DOE Notice 351.1 is now being cited as the reason to also withdraw past promises made of DOE's 'intention' to protect retiree benefits.** The policy changes the DOE was attempting to impose received strong and almost universal objections during the public comment process. The stated goal of the new policy as described in the subject Notice was to reduce spending on retiree and active worker pensions and benefits in order to increase the pace of cleanup work across the DOE complex.

In the teleconference meeting of July 19, Ms. Kolb stated that **all DOE's pension and benefits policy considerations are covered by the DOE Order 350.1.** She stated that Order 350.1 has been applicable for about eight years. **Order 350.1 allows retiree benefits to be reduced upon approval of the DOE Contract Officer.** The following is an excerpt from minutes, supplied by DOE, of the July 19 teleconference.

This is in response to SRSRA's continuing concern about the loss of the **grandfathering** promise for retiree benefit protection. *Answer:* **"Could your [pension] benefits be changed-maybe. Will they change substantially- I don't think so. Medical benefits fluctuate with everyone. I can't offer any guarantees but you shouldn't expect drastic change. Continue to rely on what we have in place for pensions at this time."** (Ingrid Kolb, DOE-HQ)

"DOE must be sensitive to the plans of the contractors but have regulated that new contractors must provide comparable benefit packages. It has been formalized in a contract, and DOE has never had a situation where a contractor has refused to pay pensions to retirees. We will take money from programs to ensure that all benefits are paid. Benefits have to and will be paid." (Ingrid Kolb, DOE-HQ)

In the teleconference meeting the SRSRA expressed continued objection to the Department's unfair and inconsistent application of DOE Order 350.1 across the DOE Complex. **The inconsistent application of their policy has caused SRS retirees to be unfairly subjected to possible future benefit reductions** while retirees at Los Alamos National Laboratory, LANL, are now covered under a new contract that explicitly excludes past retirees from future benefit reductions. In response to SRSRA question as to why the DOE allows better protection for retirees at LANL, **Ms. Kolb stated that the LANL action was unprecedented.** [See additional explanation in the Newsletter article that follows "SRS Questions on RFP for SRS Contracts"]

SRSRA Questions on Request for Proposals for SRS Contracts

The Savannah River Site Retiree Association (SRSRA) has tried to be proactive in the re-bid of the Savannah River site contracts over the past three years. We have also been following contract competitions at other DOE sites.

The SRSRA has followed the Department of Energy's (DOE) protocol using the Industry Interactive Procurement System (IIPS) for submitting comments/questions concerning the SRS Management & Operating (M&O) Request for Proposal (RFP). Many of our key requests were denied, and we were unable to discuss

these rejections with DOE SROO. As a result, SRS retirees are being treated unfairly with respect to the protections and accommodations that have been afforded retired personnel at other sites in the DOE Complex!

Description of Unfair Treatment of Incumbent SRS Retirees

Two examples of unfair treatment of incumbent Savannah River Site (SRS) retirees specified by the SRS FINAL Request for Proposals (RFP) were:

- 1) The Department of Energy (DOE) contracting officer's (CO) sole approval of reduced benefits during new contract negotiations, and
- 2) The use of Corrective Action Plans to repetitively cut incumbent retiree benefits following mandatory Ben/Value guidelines.

If left uncorrected, the above actions would allow the DOE and the Management and Operating (M&O) contractor to reduce incumbent SRS retiree benefits!

1) Reduced Incumbent Retiree Benefits at Contract Start - Sole CO Approval

The SRSRA is concerned that our request for transparent review of replacement benefit packages, as was allowed at LANL, was denied and that benefits can be reduced determined solely by the contracting officer (CO) under an undefined vague test of "comparability". The SRSRA RFP Question submitted under the Industry Interactive Procurement System (IIPS) attempted to correct this obvious inconsistency of the DOE's allowing reduced benefits for incumbent SRS retirees under the undefined CO "comparable" determination; yet, the DOE provided grandfathered "equitable" benefits for incumbent LANL retirees.

In answer to the RFP question to monitor for any moves to reduce benefits for incumbent SRS retirees at contract start, **the DOE's written response was "NO"**.

After the contract was awarded at Los Alamos, members of their retiree association (with support from an attorney and actuary) met and worked with a representative of the DOE contracting officer to develop "equitable" benefits plans.

We hope to persuade Secretary Bodman and DOE to allow members of the Savannah River Site Retiree Association to review the benefit program proposed by the new contractor and to offer input to the benefit program that is eventually put into place. (see the Chairman's letter above where **the answer at present to this hope is also "NO"**)

2) Reduced Benefits Required under Mandatory Corrective Action Plans

The SRSRA is concerned that our request to exclude incumbent SRS retiree benefits from Ben/Val Corrective Action Plans (as was done for incumbent LANL retiree benefits) will result in a series of ongoing benefit reductions for incumbent SRS retirees. The SRSRA RFP Question submitted under the IIPS attempted to correct this obvious inconsistency of driving reductions in incumbent SRS retiree benefits using mandatory Ben/Val Corrective Action Plans while shielding incumbent LANL retiree benefits from Corrective Action Plans.

In answer to the SRSRA submitted RFP question as to whether or not SRS retiree benefits would also be exempted from repetitive cuts, the DOE's written response was "NO".

Senator Domenici of New Mexico asked Secretary Bodman (during the Secretary's confirmation hearing on January 17, 2005) for the following commitment, "that Laboratory employees and retirees will maintain the existing pensions and health benefits as a result of the competition (bidding)". Secretary Bodman stated, "I am happy to make that commitment, sir." (The DOE was very responsive to Secretary Bodman's commitment based upon the changes that were made to the draft LANL RFP and subsequent amendments following issuance of the FINAL RFP.)

{Based on the responses to SRS RFP questions and before this latest teleconference with Mrs. Kolb, letters were sent by the SRSRA to elected officials requesting that they intervene on behalf of SRS retirees to protect our benefits. Letters were sent to the four Senators representing South Carolina and Georgia, the House of Representative delegation members, and the Governor of South Carolina. (Many of our SRSRA members sent individual letters as well.)

The purpose was to 1) point out that earlier letters sent by those same elected officials to DOE Secretary Bodman requesting "fair and consistent" treatment of SRS retirees by the DOE were being ignored, and 2) to request that they contact Secretary Bodman to correct the situation of unfair and inconsistent treatment.

Senator Pete Domenici initiated the benefit protection for LANL retirees, during Confirmation hearings for Secretary Samuel W. Bodman. A comparable commitment was requested of Energy Secretary Bodman, by South Carolina, and Georgia elected officials. Secretary Bodman chose to honor Senator Domenici's request but he chose to ignore identical requests from South Carolina Senators Graham and DeMint, Georgia Senators Chambliss and Isakson, South Carolina Congressmen Barrett and Wilson, and South Carolina Governor Sanford.

THE SRSRA WILL CONTINUE TO PURSUE THIS ISSUE VIGOROUSLY WITH OUR ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES.

Possible Error in BC/BS Reimbursement for Medicare Recipients

At the end of 2006, Blue Cross (BC) modified their internal procedures for determining the amounts they would allow for certain medical procedures (primarily Doctor office visits). This modification was intended to address specific issues associated with processing out-of-state Medicare claims. **In some cases, this change may have inadvertently affected the covered expense/total allowed amount shown for services provided by in-state (SC and certain Augusta, GA) providers, on BC Explanation of Benefits statements. As a result, this change may have incorrectly affected the amount that either BC or the retiree paid on a specific claim.** In response to questions raised by SRSRA members, WSRC has requested BC to promptly conduct a review of the questions raised regarding the impact of the BC change and communicate the results of their review to WSRC. SRSRA will notify you when we have more definitive information from WSRC as to how this problem may affect us and what further actions, if any, may be required.

SRS ACTIVITIES

Replacement Steam Plant

A groundbreaking ceremony for a project to replace the D Area coal-powered steam plant was conducted on June 13. The modern new steam plant will be powered by biomass (instead of coal) and will provide an efficient, long-term, reliable source of steam to A Area with minimum environmental impact. (A-Area includes the Savannah River National Laboratory and administrative facilities.) The existing steam plant was constructed initially in the 1950's and has received numerous upgrades over 50 plus years of operation. During the years of full operation, the existing plant provided steam to many areas across the SRS. The new plant will contribute significantly toward the Department of Energy's goal to lead by example in the areas of energy management and efficiency to meet President Bush's January 2007 Executive Order on Federal Environmental, Energy and Transportation Management.

SRNL Colloquium

On July 18, the Savannah River National Laboratory hosted a colloquium--"Natural Attenuation of Chlorinated Solvents in Aerobic Groundwater: A New Tool to Identify Presence and Rate of Aerobic Co-Metabolism." The topic was presented by Dr. Hope Lee of North Wind, Inc., at Aiken County's Center for Hydrogen Research, just off U.S. Highway 278 south of Aiken. The colloquium was presented in connection with the Monitored Natural Attenuation /Enhanced Attenuation Project, a three-year nationwide research program sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy Office of Environmental Management and led by SRNL, to study the use of nature's mechanisms to clean up chlorinated solvents in the groundwater. Chlorinated solvents are the most common and most widespread contaminants in soil and groundwater at DOE sites throughout the U.S. Typically, the groundwater contains dissolved oxygen, which prevents the most common natural destruction mechanism from

being active at these sites. Recent research shows that enzyme probes can be used to identify groups of organisms that contribute to a natural destruction process that occurs in the presence of dissolved oxygen. This emerging science has the potential to have a tremendous impact on cleanup activities, and could allow some sites to transition from active, energy-consuming cleanup technologies, to a passive treatment, making use of these naturally occurring organisms.

SRS MOX Facility Underway

Construction began at SRS in early August on the nearly \$5 billion Mixed Oxide (MOX) Fuel Fabrication Facility. In the seven years it will take to build, about 1,600 jobs will be created during peak construction; and approximately 800 jobs will be needed to operate the facility. The MOX program is part of a nuclear nonproliferation agreement between the U.S. and Russia to dispose of nuclear weapons material. Construction costs will be approximately \$4.8 billion and operating costs around \$180 million per year. If everything goes on schedule, the 600,000 square-foot facility will be completed in 2014 and begin operations in 2016. The mixed oxide fuel would dispose of 34 metric tons, or about 75 million pounds, of surplus weapons grade plutonium for use in commercial nuclear reactors. It is estimated that the MOX fuel will generate enough electricity for about 1 million households for 50 years.

MEMBERSHIP

At the end of July **our membership total was 958**. This is the highest number of members we have ever had. When you see fellow retirees, ask them if they are members of the SRS Retiree Association. If you know someone who took the self-select package from WSRC in June, encourage him to join. The membership for 2007 is free! The retiree can use the membership form included in their WSRC retirement package, (or get a form as indicated above). When the retiree lists a retirement date in 2007, Ed Somers will give the 2007 membership free. (SRSRA had not provided WSRC HR with an updated new-retiree membership application for 2007. As a result the June retirees were given the wrong form. A number have paid the \$15 shown on the form they received. Each of them was given the free membership for 2007 and the \$15 payment has been credited to their 2008 dues. We apologize for this mix-up.)

A few of you have sent in renewals two times this year. In each case, the money was applied to the dues payments for future years' membership. When we start the 2008 membership campaign in October / November, each of you will receive an e-mail / letter that either requests renewal and your 2008 dues payment, or tells you that your membership is already paid through 2008.

If your friends have not renewed for 2007, now is the time to remind them to join us! If they were members in 2006, they should have received an e-mail or letter with a 2007 membership form attached. If not, hook them up to our website, or have them use the membership form in this Newsletter. 2. **A reminder to out-of-state members:** In 2006, BCBS reimbursed claims were based upon South Carolina's rate structure, rather than the state in which the retiree lived or was treated. The result was that some of the reimbursements were not correct, and were probably too low. This has been corrected for 2007. **However, anyone who had such claims will need to contact BCBS to get the reimbursement corrected. They will not automatically correct the 2006 reimbursements. Out-of-state retirees must contact BCBS directly to start the process to correct their reimbursements. This is similar to the error discussed on page 5 which applies to all retirees on Medicare.**
