CHAIRMAN’S LETTER

Savannah River Nuclear Solutions (SRNS) became the new M&O contractor on August 1. As expected there were no changes in retiree benefits. We aren’t even going to have to get new medical insurance cards.

SRNS has until August 1, 2009, to develop a new Human Resources plan. We are still concerned about what this will mean for us because the Department of Energy (DOE) has not instructed SRNS to maintain the benefits we received at the time we retired. SRNS is required to verify that their new plan is within 5% of the average of comparison company plans. This will be determined using a benefit value study to be made next spring. We are actively working to maintain retiree benefits.

During a recent meeting with Mr. Jeff Allison, DOE Manager of the Savannah River Operations Office, we asked to be able to provide input to the new Human Resources plan. He encouraged our input and stated that we should work with SRNS. He said that he wanted the new Human Resources plan fully vetted by the stakeholders before it is submitted to DOE. We consider this to be a very significant development. We have been asking for this for several years. We were also pleased that Mr. Allison said he did not think the contractor could make a decision adverse to retirees given the strong support the Savannah River Site Retiree Association has with the community and our congressional delegation. We have also requested members of our congressional delegation to ask DOE to send them a copy of the proposed new Human Resources plan for review and comments before it is approved by DOE. (Mr. Allison said that they would not normally be given a copy of the proposed plan.)

SRNS took time out of their very busy schedule getting ready for transition to meet with us on July 14. Mr. Charles Munns, President of SRNS, and Ms. Esther Hodge, SRNS Human Resources Manager, attended the meeting. They confirmed that there will be no changes in retiree benefits. We informed them that Mr. Allison requested that we work with SRNS on developing the new Human Resources plan. They agreed to meet with us on a regular basis in the future, and we have set up a tentative meeting in October to start this process. At the time of the July meeting, SRNS was focusing on transition and had only the outlines of a schedule for

developing a new Human Resources plan. They expect to have the plan developed in the spring and conduct the benefit value study to evaluate the plan in May of 2009. They have until August 1, 2009, to have the plan approved by DOE.

There have been ongoing rumors on the relocation of the Pit Disassembly and Conversion Facility (PDCF) Project from SRS. To better understand the status of PDCF, a letter was sent from the CSRA Congressional delegation to Energy Secretary Bodman requesting a briefing on DOE and NNSA plans for this facility. This item was discussed with Congressman Gresham Barrett during our August 19 meeting with him (see below).

The committee we set up to develop a proposal to obtain a pension adjustment to restore the purchasing power of our pensions has drafted the proposal and defined a path forward. The increase in the Cost of Living Index from 1989 to 2007 is graphically shown below. The new contractor, SRNS, will be asked to support our proposal and to contract a firm to calculate the cost of the pension adjustment. In addition, SRNS will be asked to request funding for the pension adjustment in the 2010 budget. We had told Mr. Munns that we were working on a proposal for a pension adjustment at an introduction meeting last summer. At our meeting with SRNS in July, he said that he had already discussed this with DOE during a recent visit to DOE Headquarters. We do not have an excess in our pension trust fund so that a pension adjustment will require new funding. We will be requesting that our congressional delegation consider our proposal and ask DOE to have SRNS contract an actuarial study to determine the cost of the pension adjustment. Congress will then have to provide the funds for this adjustment. DOE has told us several times during the past two years that we have the right to request a pension adjustment but has not indicated that they would support such a request. We obviously have a lot of work ahead of us to get support and approval from our congressional delegation, SRNS, and DOE. Then Congress needs to find additional funding for DOE to pay for the adjustment.

As part of our periodic updates with our Congressional delegation, we met with Congressman Gresham Barrett on August 19 to discuss three issues: pension adjustment, suggestions for SRSRA to support the PDCF Project at SRS, and providing full funding for H-Canyon.

The Congressman gave us an overview of the status of the PDCF Project and he indicated that the issues have not been resolved at this time. We are therefore planning to send letters of concern to DOE Secretary Bodman and Under Secretary for Nuclear Security (NNSA) Tom D'Agostino strongly requesting that the PDCF Project continue at SRS as planned (per the DOE Record of Decision in 2000) and that full funding be provided for H-Canyon.


Furthermore, Congressman Barrett agreed to organize and lead the CSRA Congressional delegation in supporting our pension adjustment efforts.

MESSAGE FROM SAVANNAH RIVER NUCLEAR SOLUTIONS

As I write this, we at Savannah River Nuclear Solutions are four days into our term as the M&O Contractor for SRS. As you can imagine, it's a hectic time, but we are grateful that the anticipation is over and that our responsibilities have begun.

Throughout our pursuit of the contract, we recognized that the Savannah River Site had a history of extraordinary work, and we congratulate you for what you accomplished. During the contract transition, we came to recognize that the people who work and have worked at SRS are a national treasure. There's a remarkable knowledge base at the Site, and there should be continuing missions here well into the future. SRS RETIREE 2009 ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The 2009 Annual Meeting has been scheduled for Tuesday April 14, 2009. The meeting location will be St Angela Hall in Aiken. This is the same location used for the 2008 Annual Meeting. SRS ACTIVITIES

New Contractor Assumes Management and Operations of SRS

On July 31, 2008, DOE-SR Manager Jeff Allison, and the Savannah River Nuclear Solution's (SRNS) President and Chief Executive Officer, Charles L. Munns, signed the final documents validating the operational readiness of SRNS to manage and operate the Savannah River Site (SRS). At 12:01 a.m. on August 1, SRNS took over as the new M&O contractor, replacing WSRC, who will continue operating the radioactive liquid waste facilities and other identified functions. Prior to WSRC, E.I. du Pont de Nemours and Company was the operating contractor. The new M&O contract runs from January 2008 through December 2012 with a five-year option from January 2013 through December 2017. The contract is a cost-plus award-fee contract valued at approximately \$800 million per year for the five-year base period. SRNS will also manage the SRS pension fund.

Modifications Expand H Canyon Capabilities, Ease Burden on Waste Tanks

WSRC recently completed one of the most extensive reconfigurations H Canyon has seen since it began operating in 1955, expanding the facility's capabilities, reducing waste generation, and preserving space in the Site's liquid waste storage tanks. The reconfiguration was performed in stages and took over four years to complete. H Canyon is the only operational large-scale chemical separations facility of its kind in the United States. It is designed to chemically separate and recover useful nuclear materials and discard generated waste in a liquid form to nearby H Tank Farm. SRS engineers and operations personnel developed an approach that took

an existing unit operation and reconfigured piping routes and process tanks. It revised numerous processing procedures in order to split waste streams into high-level and low-level. The high-level portion goes to the tank farms, as it always has, while the low-level portion now goes to Saltstone feed tanks. Saltstone is the SRS facility that disposes of low-level liquid waste by turning it into a concrete-like grout. WSRC projects that it will reduce its high-level waste generation by up to 90,000 gallons per year, at a cost savings of approximately \$20 million over a five-year period.

Final Cleaning Of Next Two Radioactive Waste Tanks Begins

An acid addition to two Savannah River Site liquid radioactive waste storage tanks marks the final cleaning step in the Site's tank closure process for these two tanks. The two 750,000-gallon tanks, Tanks 5 and 6, are no longer in use and are designated as non-compliant. Both are scheduled to be closed in 2010. Safely closing waste tanks involves a set of steps that includes emptying the waste tanks of bulk waste, then removing as much of the residual waste as possible. Once that's complete, the tanks can be filled with grout created especially for these waste tanks. This grouting process permanently seals the tanks from future use while binding the residual waste into the grout. Chemical cleaning of both tanks is scheduled to be completed by the end of September.

12 Metric Tons of Nuclear Weapons Material Removed From NNSA Sites

A sizeable amount of U.S. nuclear weapons material has been removed from nuclear weapons sites this fiscal year, according to the head of the Department of Energy's National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA). With the completion of a recent shipment from NNSA's Y-12 National Security Complex, a total of 12 metric tons (or more than 26,000 pounds) of plutonium and highly enriched uranium (HEU) is now on the path to disposition and will no longer be able to be used in a nuclear weapon. Excess HEU is shipped to different facilities for conversion to low enriched uranium (LEU) which cannot be used in a nuclear weapon. Much of the LEU from Y-12 is used for the Reliable Fuel Supply Initiative, which would supply fuel for countries with good nonproliferation credentials. The surplus plutonium is sent to SRS where it is to be turned into MOX fuel.

DOE Marks Key Cleanup and Closure Milestones at the Savannah River Site

In June, U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Assistant Secretary for Environmental Management (EM), James A. Rispoli, marked the start of normal operations of interim salt waste processing facilities - the Actinide Removal Process (ARP) and the Modular Caustic Side Solvent Extraction Unit (MCU) - and the official closure of the General Separations Area Consolidated Unit (GSACU) at DOE's SRS. Removing the salt waste, which fills approximately 90 percent of the tank space in the SRS tank farms, is a major step toward closing the Site's 49 high-level waste tanks that currently contain about 36 million gallons of waste.

An employee "celebration" recognizing successful startup of key interim salt waste removal facilities was held on June 19, 2008. Mike French represented SRSRA at the function. There were several congressional staffers as well as local politicians present, and we were pleased to interact with them on behalf of our Association----both the dignitaries and the current employees.

SRSEA UPDATE

To better reflect its mission, the ORA recently changed its name to Savannah River Site Employee Association (SRSEA). Therefore, this section of the Newsletter has been re-titled SRSEA Update.

With the recent sale of the SRSEA Recreation Site to Aiken County, many SRSEA participants have been curious as to what is being done with funds received from the sale. It has been a little over 6 months since the sale of the property closed, and the SRSEA has received the final payment. However, in that short time frame, SRSEA has successfully invested the funds into a secure portfolio with a reputable investment company that will ensure SRSEA's existence for many years to come. Funds will be drawn from the investment as needed to offset operating expenses as well as to fund current and future activities. You can see some benefit of the sale through the pricing of certain tickets offered at the store. In the past a very small upcharge was added to each ticket to help generate some funds and offset costs. Now, most tickets are sold at SRSEA cost. In addition, the participants in the soccer and softball leagues are seeing the benefits as the participation fees for these leagues have been reduced

In the somewhat near future, you should begin to see changes in the SRSEA store regarding the type of merchandise that is carried, as well as the overall appearance. The SRSEA Board welcomes any input you might have as to what you would like to see as a potential benefit. Please feel free to contact the SRSEA if you have an activity you would like them to pursue or even if you just have a question for them. These SRSEA Board members would like to hear from you.

SRSRA MEDICAL INTERFACE COMMITTEE

INSURANCE COUNSELING ASSISTANCE & REFERRALS FOR ELDERS (I-CARE)

Dale Friar, SRSRA Medical Interface Committee Chairman, has successfully completed the initial training course of the Lt. Governor's Office on Aging I-CARE program. After successful completion of the training, staff and volunteers serve as certified I-CARE counselors in their communities. Counselors provide telephone

assistance or sometimes meet with clients individually to provide objective information about health insurance coverage, advocacy assistance, or make referral as appropriate.

WHAT IS I-CARE?

Many senior citizens have questions about medical protection, but don't know where to find answers. I-CARE is a staff and volunteer counselor organization designed to help local senior citizens with Medicare and other health insurance. I-CARE Volunteers are specially trained to assist beneficiaries when they need help with Medicare, other health insurance claims, information on Medicare Supplement policies, Medicare Advantage plans, long-term care insurance, Medicaid and prescription drugs.

MISSION

The mission of the I-Care Program is to:

- provide information for the public regarding Medicare and other senior health insurance options, rates and issues; and
- provide Medicare consumers, caregivers and the public with accurate, and objective counseling, assistance and advocacy relating to Medicare, Medicaid, Medicare supplement prescription drugs and other health insurance.

Older Americans often have questions about health insurance but all too frequently have limited resources to obtain objective information. Many senior citizens are in need of help and counseling in deciding what kinds of benefits would suit their needs, the amount of health insurance coverage they should have, and how to take full advantage of the coverage they already have.

With a myriad of insurance companies specializing in selling Medicare supplements, long-term care insurance, and other insurance products to a rapidly growing segment of the older adult population, and with the ever-changing Medicare system, many people become vulnerable to unfair practices. Untold dollars are being wasted by consumers as a result of complex or inaccurate information about health insurance coverage and claim procedures.

BLUE CROSS/BLUE SHIELD EOB DEFINITIONS

For your continued education, here are some Explanation of Benefits definitions provided by our BC/BS customer service representative that you might find helpful:

Benefit Period - the period of time you must pay any deductibles and coinsurance payments that may apply. Benefits begin once you meet the deductible. If you reach the limit, we pay covered expenses in full for the rest of the benefit period. Deductibles and coinsurance start over with each new benefit period.

Coinsurance - the percentage of the allowed amount you pay as your share of the bill. If your plan pays 80%, then 20% would be your coinsurance.

Copayment - a set fee you pay each time you receive a certain service. Some plans do not have co-payments.

Deductible - the amount, if any that you are responsible for paying before we start paying contract benefits. You do not send this amount to us. We subtract this amount from covered expenses on the claims you and health care professionals send to us.

Less Benefit Limitation - the amount that is more than your contract allows for this type of service. Your plan covers these services until you have reached the limit of your benefits.

Network Participation - this column shows whether or not the health care professional who provided the service participates in our network. If "YES" this is a network participant. If "NO" this is not a network participant. If "N/A", the issue doesn't apply to your coverage, or this particular claim.

Out-of-pocket-maximum - the highest amount of the covered expenses you will have to pay during a benefit period.

Total Benefit Allowed - the amount we would have paid if another insurance carrier were not involved.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT OPT-OUT PROVIDERS

(Summer Re-run of an article first appearing in SRSRA Newsletter, May, 2005)

You can't be asked to sign a private contract in an emergency situation or when you need urgent care.

A vexing situation appears to be repeating itself with greater frequency for SRSRA retirees age 65 and over. Vital health care needs are not always available from Medicare Providers. This may occur in one of two situations. One, Medicare does NOT cover the medically necessary test or treatment. Two, best practice providers have chosen to "Opt-Out" of Medicare.

The first situation involving a Medicare non-covered item is not too problematic. Medicare requires the provider to inform you that Medicare probably will not pay and have you sign an Advanced Beneficiary Notice, ABN. Sometimes the Medicare non-covered item is still covered by the SRS Team Health coverage being administered by BCBS. Medicare may not cover an item at all, only at specified frequencies, or only when medically necessary. On occasion reports have been noted that ABNs are being used for medically unnecessary items that serve only to protect the provider from liability.

The second situation involving providers that have chosen to Opt-Out of Medicare is most problematic. Opt-Out providers can gouge out whatever the market will bear.

In this situation, as prescribed by US Code, Our Health Choice self-insured plan is still only the "secondary" insurance. As such, when the benefit coordination occurs the portion that Medicare ("primary") would have

paid (called the Medicare “limiting” amount) is first subtracted. This is sometimes referred to as the “carve-out”.

Recently a SRSRA member reported a case where the only successful health care option was from a provider that has chosen to Opt-Out of the Medicare system. Medicare refers to this as a “Private Contract”. See your copy of Medicare & You 2008, p. 36, also on-line at <http://www.medicare.gov/Publications/Pubs/pdf/10050.pdf>.

Medicare Instructions include the following information:

- **You can’t be asked to sign a private contract in an emergency situation or when you need urgent care.**
- Medicare won’t pay any amount for the services you get from this doctor
- You will have to pay whatever this doctor or provider charges you for the services you get
- If you have a Medigap policy, it won’t pay anything for this service. Call your Medigap insurance company before you get the service if you have questions.
- Many other Medicare health plans won’t pay for the service either
- **Your doctor must tell you if Medicare will pay for the service if you get it from another doctor who participates in Medicare**
- **Your doctor must tell you if he or she has been excluded from the Medicare Program**

If you want to pay out-of-pocket for services Medicare doesn’t cover, your doctor doesn’t have to leave Medicare or ask you to sign a private contract. You are always free to get non-covered services on your own if you choose to pay for the service yourself. See page 26 for a list of services and items that Medicare doesn’t cover. You may want to contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) to get help before signing a private contract with any doctor or other health care provider.
