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CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

Plan to attend your SRS Retiree Association Annual Meeting March 29, 2005, at the Washington Performing Arts Building, 124 Newberry Street NW Aiken, SC across from the Alley. The meeting starts at 1:00 P.M.; come at noon for light snacks and a chance to visit with friends. This is a very important meeting; you will hear from Pres Rahe, President of Washington Group, Inc. Mr. Rahe will provide an update on SRS and his projections for SRS's future. Your Chairman will provide the State of the SRS Retiree Association; you won't want to miss it because much has happened this past year.

Representatives from your Board of Directors met with Mr. Bob Pedde, WSRC President, on February 3 and we met with Mr. Jeff Allison, DOE SROO Manager, on February 24. We are working with Mr. Richard Perry, Senator Lindsey Graham's Chief of Staff, to arrange a visit to Washington, DC for a meeting with members of the South Carolina/Georgia Delegations and any others that Mr. Perry might recommend. He is currently arranging the meeting schedule for the second week of March. The primary purpose of our trip is to ask Senator Graham to take the lead in convincing the DOE to include wording in the pending (2006) SRS Request for Proposal (RFP) for a new management contract that will protect our benefits. We have provided an advance copy of your Board's preferred RFP wording to Senator Graham. I might add that the late Senator Strom Thurmond had similar wording included in the RFP for the current SRS Contract. Your Chairman participated as an invited guest with other Community Leaders at a meeting on February 1 with South Carolina

Congressman Gresham Barrett. This is the second such meeting with Congressman Barrett. Congressman Barrett is very supportive of the SRS Retirees. His opening statement at the last meeting was "My Staff is Your Staff". The key item of the February 1 meeting was a major thrust for a Nuclear Energy Park at SRS. Look for more on this in the news in the near future.

Retiree concerns regarding medical benefits issues are an ongoing agenda item. If you have a issue that you would like the Medical Benefits Committee to know about, send it by e-mail to boardofdirectors@srsretirees.org or by regular mail to the address at the top of this page. We have seen many instances where Blue Cross/Blue Shield has erred on carve-out fees paid for procedures for those of us on Medicare. We are making headway on this issue. Your BOD Medical Benefits Committee has succeeded in making WSRC and BS/BC aware of problems in the BS/BC paperwork process. We have provided wording to Mr. Pedde for directing BS/BC carve-out payments to ensure retirees do not pay more for medical procedures than working employees currently pay. I advise you to understand your bills from Medical Providers if you are on Medicare. We will keep you informed of progress in our negotiations with WSRC and BS/BC.

SRSRA 2005 ANNUAL MEETING

The 2005 SRS Retiree Association annual meeting will be held on Tuesday March 29 at the Playhouse at 124 Newberry Street NW in Aiken. The doors will open at 12:00 noon for registration and socializing. The formal meeting will begin at 1:00 P.M. Mr. Pres Rahe, President of Washington Group Inc., the parent company of the Westinghouse Savannah River Company, will be the keynote speaker. We expect Bob Pedde, President of WSRC, to be in attendance as well. An invitation has been extended to Mr. Jeff Allison, DOE SROO Manager, as well. We have invited all of our local Senators and Congressmen. We expect that the congressional members or their representatives will attend. It is important that a large number of retirees attend the meeting because our influence with our members of Congress is based in part on the size and level of support of the members of the SRS Retiree Association. In this day and age when the trend is to reduce or eliminate retiree benefits we need all the help we can get.

As we've done in the past, we plan to have representatives from Blue Cross/Blue Shield and Medicare at the meeting to answer your questions and assist in resolving any problems you are having with health insurance issues. (See the Medical Benefits Issues section later in this newsletter.)

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT

The SRSRA Board of Directors (BOD) consists of 30 representatives elected by the membership at large during the annual meeting. The BOD members are elected to serve two-year terms and are split into two groups, each group serving on a staggered basis such that 15 members are elected each year. This is done to assure a steady supply of new talent and ideas to the Board as well as to provide valuable needed continuity. The Nominating Committee has put together a list of 15 candidates for election to the BOD. This list will be presented to the membership and proposed for election at the upcoming annual meeting of all SRSRA members on March 29. Each of the 15 candidates has indicated a willingness to serve if elected. Ballots comprising these 15 names are in preparation for use at the annual meeting.

BENEFITS TRIP PLANNED

The pending March trip to Washington by a committee of BOD members is being coordinated with Senator Graham's staff. The staff will help organize the committee's visit to discuss the SRSRA's concerns and the needs of the organization's members. The committee intends to brief members of the South Carolina and Georgia delegations and senior DOE management on the SRSRA organization and our objectives with regard to the Site operations and members' benefits. The committee has already discussed these items with WSRC management and local DOE management to give them insight to our planned trip.

PEDDE NOTIFIES WSRC EMPLOYEES OF POTENTIAL LAYOFFS

On December 14, 2004, WSRC President Bob Pedde notified WSRC employees that authority had been requested from DOE to reduce the SRS workforce by 1,200 positions this fiscal year and an additional 600 to 800 positions next year. Any approved force reductions will affect both management and wage-roll employees. WSRC was hopeful it would receive DOE authority and be able to notify affected employees early in 2005.

Pedde noted that these necessary workforce restructuring measures, though regrettable, are in part the result of WSRC's excellent performance in completing assigned missions and deactivation of facilities that are no longer needed to support the DOE mission. The deactivation of F Area by 2006, the removal of plutonium from F Canyon, completion of FB Line plutonium packaging, demolition of over 100 excess buildings, and the consolidation of spent fuel storage facilities are examples of this progress. As missions are completed and facilities decommissioned, personnel that were once needed to operate and maintain these now obsolete operations are no longer needed. Despite normal efforts to reassign and retrain personnel for existing missions, there is still a need to reduce the workforce.

Early retirement incentives will not be available for this restructuring; however, the Washington Group International and partners are committed to working with the region to help it adjust to the impact of these restructuring measures and to support efforts to diversify the local economy. The partnership plans to continue support for development of the Savannah River National Laboratory; the Governor's efforts to establish the region as a technology hub; the identification of jobs for talented employees elsewhere in the corporation; and new regional businesses such as Westinghouse Safety Management Solutions, which employees about 350 local people.

(Editor's Note: On Tuesday February 15, 2005, DOE approved the reduction-in-force program and the WSRC plan was set in motion.)

Life Insurance Available for Early Stage Alzheimer's Patients

Mass Mutual, the insurance carrier who provides discounted premium Long-Term Care and Supplemental Disability Income Insurance coverage for members of the SRS-ORA, has announced it now offers life insurance coverage to individuals who are early-stage Alzheimer's patients.

Many ORA members have inquired about obtaining long-term care insurance for a spouse or parent who has Alzheimer's. Unfortunately, there are no insurance carriers who offer long-term care coverage to those with the disease.

Alzheimer's doesn't affect just the elderly. There is an increase in the United States of incidents of early-onset Alzheimer's (ages 45-65). It is not unusual to hear of someone with Alzheimer's disease giving up a lucrative career at a relatively young age. The impact on family income, retirement planning, long-term care planning, etc., can be devastating. While long-term care insurance pays tax-free benefits during an individual's lifetime, life insurance pays a tax-free benefit upon an insured's death. Having a sufficient amount of life insurance for an individual with Alzheimer's disease can, at the insured's death:

- Restore personal or family savings which may have been utilized to pay for the patient's long-term care, family living costs, etc.;
- Repay bank loans or second mortgages that may have paid long-term care costs, or subsidized or replaced family income; and
- Repay loans or withdrawals from 401(k) s or IRA's which may have paid long-term care costs, or subsidized or replaced family income.

Those of you with a family member who has Alzheimer's may want to consider the value of this type coverage. Are you currently providing care---or paying for the care---of someone with Alzheimer's? Is it affecting your financial well-being?

Policies can be issued up to age 90. Premiums will be based upon the individual's age, physical health and the advancement of the dementia. Example: A 75-year old female nonsmoker with early-stage Alzheimer's (and who is in otherwise excellent health) may obtain a \$250,000 policy with premium and death benefit guaranteed

level for 10 years for \$412 per month; premium and death benefit guaranteed level to age 100 for \$854 per month.

NOTE: If you or a member of your immediate family purchases a Mass Mutual life insurance policy, you get an additional first-year premium discount (10%) for Long-Term Care or Supplemental Disability Income Insurance for you and/or your spouse. This is in addition to the ORA discount!

SRS ACTIVITIES

New Safety Record at The Savannah River Site

Bechtel Savannah River, Inc. construction employees achieved their first-ever safety milestone of 15 million safe hours without an injury resulting in days away from work. This represents almost six and a half years since BSRI's last 'lost workday' case on June 23, 1998. The new milestone was reached on December 9. Fifteen-million safe hours is equivalent to 7,500 employees working without a major injury in the construction industry for one year. An average construction firm in the United States usually experiences 210 lost-time accidents in 15 million hours worked.

Major Construction Completed At Tritium Extraction Facility

The Savannah River Site recognized the completion of construction of the Tritium Extraction Facility's major process systems. The \$506 million project, a key part of the supply system for the nation's nuclear weapons stockpile, is forecast to start operations about 10 months ahead of the baseline schedule. The facility will be used to extract tritium (a radioactive form of hydrogen) from materials irradiated in Tennessee Valley Authority commercial nuclear reactors. Tritium is essential for modern nuclear weapons but it decays rapidly and must be replenished. About 90 percent of the facility's systems have been turned over for startup testing, the next step toward completion of the project.

WSRC Donation to S.C. Department of Commerce

Westinghouse Savannah River Company (WSRC) has given the S.C. Department of Commerce a \$35,000 donation to aid in the economic development of the CSRA. The money will be used to assist in a Department of Commerce economic diversification initiative, which will leverage SRS expertise in chemical and hydrogen technology to establish a regional economic development hub.

The Savannah River National Laboratory's half-century of support for SRS' tritium programs has resulted in unmatched expertise in the handling, processing and storage of tritium and other forms of hydrogen. That expertise is finding new uses, as the country moves toward the use of hydrogen as a significant energy source for cars, homes and industries.

Receipts are higher than normal this time of the year primarily due to moving the annual membership drive up to the Fall of the year rather than in the Spring of the year. A membership year coincides with the calendar year. The major expenditures to date are Newsletter printing costs, postage for Newsletter and Membership Committee, and Annual meeting deposits.

PROPOSED BYLAWS REVISION

The SRSRA BOD agreed earlier this year to recognize a membership year that is based on the calendar year.

However, the current Bylaws are unclear relative to a "membership year" in the Association. At the November Board of Directors meeting, it was agreed that **at the upcoming 2005 Annual Meeting, we will propose a Bylaws change to formalize exactly what comprises our "membership year" and that the "membership year" will, in fact, be based on the calendar year.**

RETIREES SUPPORT UNITED WAY

Many retirees chose to support their area United Way programs through the solicitation sponsored by the SRSRA as part of the WSRC campaign. For the 2005 UW campaign, SRSRA members donated \$7,700.

MEDICAL BENEFITS ISSUES

Annual Meeting an Opportunity to Resolve Medical Benefits Problems

Retirees will have a special opportunity at the upcoming Annual Meeting (March 29) to resolve any problems they may be having with reimbursement from Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

Last year, we asked retirees to bring copies of their paperwork so that the BC/BS representative could understand their problem and take the information back to Columbia, SC, to resolve the problem. That was very helpful to all, and everyone was pleased with the opportunity and the help.

This year Kaye Bozeman, the BC/BS Representative who is now handling the SRS account, will be at the SRSRA Annual Meeting. The big news this year is that Ms. Bozeman will be able to go online immediately to resolve your problem. She will have her laptop computer with her and will have access to the internet before, during, and after the meeting. She will be able to resolve your problems in real time while you wait!! Come early (doors open at 12:00 noon) to take full advantage of this opportunity. Be sure to bring your paperwork (EOB statements, Dr. and hospital bills, etc.) so that she will have all the information needed to help you.

Medical Issues

The most critical issue regarding medical benefits for retirees who are 65 or older is the inequity in the way the carve out is computed. (This is the amount that is reduced from the BC/BS benefit because of Medicare insurance coverage.) In many cases, this is being computed in a way that makes retirees on Medicare pay more out-of-pocket cost than they would have had to pay before they became eligible for Medicare. We are currently working to correct this problem.

BC/BS Service Concerns

We have many letters from retirees trying to get proper Blue Cross/Blue Shield reimbursement for their medical bills. Most of the problems occur when the retiree/patient lives out-of-state (i.e., no longer in SC). If you have records of BC/BS service problems to share with SRSRA members, please **send a letter outlining your case to both:**
