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CHAIRMAN’S LETTER

There have been two important developments in the area of benefits since my last letter. First, the retiree portion of the cost for the medical and dental plans for post 1998 retirees was raised about 25% for 2009. This was disconcerting news and we requested that SRNS provide us with additional information about the basis for the increase. Staff members of Ms. Esther Hodge, SRNS’ Vice President for Human Resources, came to our November Board meeting and presented the following information. The percentage of the medical premium paid by retirees and incumbent employees was increased from approximately 20% to approximately 25%. We were told that the basis for this increase was a comparison of our plans to those of peer companies used in benefit value studies. The expected costs for 2009 were also increased to account for the continuing increases for medical procedures and the expected increase in the number of procedures. The allocation of retiree and incumbent employee costs for the various categories in our plan were revised. The cost for the category retiree plus one dependent, which includes most of us, did not correctly account for the portion of the total cost for this group. The cost for this category was increased a larger fraction. We were also told that, in terms of a benefit value, retiree health benefits increased the overall SRS value because a number of the comparison companies have dropped medical coverage for retirees. We are concerned about the future. The Department of Energy has no policy for retirees so that there is no formal acknowledgement that there is a legacy obligation to maintain post retirement benefits and the trend in the comparison companies is to drop or reduce retiree medical benefits. Retirees also are hit harder with annual increases in medical premium costs because we have a fixed pension, while incumbent employees have an implicit cost of living factor in their wage and salary increases. We have been making these points for the last several years during the contract negotiation but we obviously have more work to do.

Second, we have formally started the process to obtain a pension adjustment. On December 15, 2008 we met with Mr. Charles Munns, President and CEO of SRNS, and members of his staff to present our case for a pension adjustment. As discussed in my last letter, the process is started by a request from the contractor to the Department of Energy which then includes the adjustment in a budget submittal to congress. We had a limited objective in this initial meeting. That objective was to get SRNS to agree to request that the Department of Energy authorize and fund a study to determine the cost of a pension adjustment for several cases. Our base case was for an adjustment in 2010 for all retirees to increase their pensions to account for the increase in the cost of living since the date each of them retired. SRNS agreed to make the request but, in light of the impact of

the recent drop in the stock market on our pension trust, they would not commit to pursuing a pension adjustment at this time. We still think that we need to get congressional support for an increase in funding for the Department of Energy to pay for this adjustment. We had addressed this adjustment with Congressman Gresham Barrett in September and at that time he gave conditional support but said he needed to know what the adjustment would cost. The study we asked SRNS to make will provide the answer for him as well as DOE and SRNS. We will keep you informed of progress on this adjustment.

As part of our charter to support new programs for the Savannah River Site, several Board members attended a Department of Energy public meeting on December 4th to provide input on the Draft Global Nuclear Energy Partnership (GNEP) Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement. Proposals under consideration include reprocessing of spent nuclear fuel and designs of new reactors to burn actinides. The overall objectives are to fully utilize our uranium resources, reduce the amount of nuclear waste that needs to be stored and reduce the possibility of nuclear proliferation by having well secured, centralized reprocessing facilities. Mike French and I read letters of support for the program. These letters were entered into the formal minutes of the meeting. We also recommended that SRS be considered for a demonstration reprocessing plant even though this was outside the scope of the present draft.

I would like to take this opportunity to encourage as many of you as possible to attend our 2009 Annual Meeting on Tuesday April 14. We expect to have members of congress or their staffers, Mr. Jeff Allison, DOE Manager at SRS and Mr. Charles Munns, President and CEO of SRNS, who will give the keynote address. Your attendance at the meeting shows your support of the work by the Association to maintain our pensions and benefits. The meeting will also give you a chance to hear about ongoing work and plans for the future and to ask questions about the Association. I look forward to seeing you on April 14th.

RETIREMENT PLANS REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION CHANGES

On December 23, 2008, the President signed the Worker, Retiree, and Employer Recovery Act of 2008 (the Act) into law. Section 201 of the Act waives any required minimum distribution (RMD) for 2009 from retirement plans that hold each participant's benefit in an individual account, such as 401(k) plans and 403(b) plans, and certain 457(b) plans. The Act also waives any RMD's for 2009 from an Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA). This means that most participants and beneficiaries, otherwise required to take minimum distributions from these types of accounts, are not required to withdraw any amount in 2009. If you received a Required Distribution Letter (RMD) from Hewitt Associates for 2009 advising the need to take a distribution this year from your SIP, that letter should have been replaced by a subsequent letter from Hewitt advising you of the change discussed in the paragraph above.

SRSRA has been discussing this issue with SRNS to resolve the earlier information distributed by Hewitt. SRNS has recognized that the late December passage of the Act has created an implementation problem and is working to resolve the issue with Hewitt. If you did not receive a revised letter from Hewitt, please review your situation directly with Hewitt or with the benefits contacts at SRNS. SRSRA MEDICAL INTERFACE COMMITTEE

Explanation of Benefits (EOB') s for Out-of-State Providers

One of our retirees brought the following problem to our attention: They received an EOB from BC/BS that indicated their provider was not a member of the preferred provider network. After the retiree verified that their provider was indeed a member of the network, BC/BS informed us that some EOBs with **out-of-state** providers may indicate that the provider is not in the network (opposite Network Participation 'NO' appears) when, in actuality, the provider is a participant in the provider network. This is an ongoing programming problem that BC/BS confirms they are attempting to rectify. They have assured us that even though the EOB may indicate that the provider is not in the network, the account is being paid correctly.

Self-Administered Drugs Given in Hospital Outpatient Settings

Medicare Part B (Medical Insurance) generally covers care you get in a hospital outpatient setting like an emergency room, observation unit, surgery center, or pain clinic. Part B only covers certain drugs in these settings, like drugs given through an IV (intravenous infusion). Sometimes people with Medicare need "self-administered drugs" while in hospital outpatient settings. "Self-administered drugs" are drugs you would normally take on your own. Part B generally doesn't pay for self-administered drugs unless they are required for the hospital outpatient services you're getting. If you get self-administered drugs that aren't covered by Medicare Part B while in a hospital outpatient setting, the hospital may bill you for the drug. However, if you are enrolled in a Medicare drug plan (Part D), these drugs may be covered.

What You Should Know About Medicare Drug Plans (Part D) and Self-Administered Drugs

- Generally, your Medicare drug plan only covers prescription drugs and won't pay for over-the-counter drugs you get, like Tylenol® or Milk-of-Magnesia®.
- Any drug you get needs to be on your Medicare drug plan's formulary (or covered by an exception).
- You can't get your self-administered drugs in an outpatient or emergency room setting on a regular basis.
- Your Medicare drug plan will check to see if you could have gotten these self-administered drugs from an in-network pharmacy.
- Since most hospital pharmacies don't participate in Medicare Part D, you may need to pay up front and out-of-pocket for these drugs and submit the claim to your Medicare drug plan for a refund. Check with your hospital to see if they participate in Part D. If possible, bring any drugs or a list of drugs you are taking with you to the hospital and show them to the staff. It helps the hospital staff to know what drugs you take at home.

What Should I Do If I Get a Bill for Self-Administered Drugs That Aren't Covered by Part B in a Hospital Outpatient Setting?

- Follow the instructions in your Medicare drug plan's (Part D) enrollment materials on how to submit an out-of-network claim, or call your plan for information about how to submit a claim.
- Your plan will ask you to send certain information like the emergency room bill that shows what self-administered drugs you were given. You may also need to explain the reason for your hospital visit. Keep copies of any receipts and any paperwork you send your plan.

What Will My Medicare Drug Plan (Part D) Do? (Most SRS retirees do not participate in the Medicare Part D Prescription Drug Plan)

- Your Medicare drug plan will check to see if the drug is on your Medicare drug plan's formulary, otherwise you may need to file an exception.
- Your plan may ask you if you could have reasonably gotten any of the drugs from a participating network pharmacy. For example, if you could have taken a dose of a drug that you got from your network pharmacy before your outpatient hospital appointment, your Medicare drug plan may not pay you back for that drug.
- If the drug is covered by your Medicare drug plan, your plan may only reimburse you the in-network cost for the drug minus any deductibles, copayments, or coinsurance that you would normally be charged for the drug.

What Will I Have to Pay for Self-Administered Drugs That Aren't Covered by Part B?

- If the drug is covered by your Medicare drug plan (Part D), you may need to pay the difference between what the hospital charged and what the plan paid in addition to any deductibles, copayments, or coinsurance you would normally pay. This amount counts towards your Part D out-of-pocket costs. You must submit the claim to your plan in order for it to count towards your out-of-pocket costs.
- If the drug isn't covered by your Medicare drug plan, you need to pay what the hospital charges for the drug. As mentioned above, you can always request an exception if your plan tells you that a drug isn't on their formulary.

Where Can I Get More Help?

- Call your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP). Every state and territory, plus Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and the District of Columbia has a SHIP with counselors who can give you free health insurance information and help. To get the telephone number for your SHIP, visit www.medicare.gov, or call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227).
- For information on how to appeal any decision made by your Medicare drug plan, check your plan's enrollment materials or call your plan.

SRS ACTIVITIES (INCLUDES DOE, SRNS AND WSRC)

Ground Broken for Second Facility in SRS Plutonium Disposition Complex

On January 16, 2009, workers broke ground for the second facility in the Savannah River Site's (SRS) plutonium disposition complex. The Mixed Oxide Fuel Fabrication Facility (MFFF) is well under way, with construction having begun in August of 2007. The new facility is the Waste Solidification Building (WSB), which will process low-level and transuranic liquid waste streams from MFFF and pit disassembly operations. At the invitation of DOE, members of the SRSRA Board of Directors attended the groundbreaking ceremony. In the WSB, material classified as transuranic (TRU) waste will be packaged and sent to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico. Low-level waste will be packaged and sent to disposal facilities either at SRS or off site.

The WSB will occupy about nine acres adjacent to the MOX site in F Area, near the center of SRS. It will be a concrete building about 200 feet long and 165 feet wide. The total estimated cost for design, construction and startup is \$345 million, which has been independently reviewed and validated. The facility is expected to begin operations in 2013.

DOE Selects Savannah River Remediation, LLC, for Liquid Waste Contract at SRS

On December, 8, 2008, DOE announced selection of Savannah River Remediation, LLC as the liquid waste contractor at SRS. The contract is a cost-plus award-fee contract valued at approximately \$3.3 billion over the entire contract, consisting of a base period of six years, plus an option to extend for up to two additional years. The base performance period of the contract will be from April 1, 2009, through March 31, 2015.

Savannah River Remediation, LLC, is a limited liability company consisting of URS Washington Division; Babcock & Wilcox Technical Services Group, Inc.; Bechtel National, Inc.; CH2M Hill Constructors, Inc.; and AREVA Federal Services, LLC. Pre-selected subcontractors include Energy Solutions Federal EPC, Inc. and Washington Safety Management Solutions, LLC.

DOE received notification from the Government Accountability Office (GAO) on December 22, 2008, of a protest filed by Savannah River Tank Closure, LLC, (STC) on the award of the contract to Savannah River Remediation, LLC. Consistent with the Competition in Contracting Act, DOE stayed performance of the Liquid Waste contract and the Comptroller General is expected to issue a recommendation on the protest within 100 calendar days, or by April 1, 2009. During the stay of performance, SRR will not be able to begin the 90-day contract transition period; Work will continue to be performed by the incumbent contractor, Washington Savannah River Company (WSRC).

SRS to Host Tours for General Public

At the suggestion of SRSRA and other interested groups SRS is once again opening its gates for a limited number of tours for the general public.

On a trial basis, six open public tours will be conducted in March for 300 individuals. Two drive-by tours will be offered on March 5, 11 and 24. Tour participation is on a first-come, first-served basis through online registration only. These six tours filled up in a matter of a few days, indicating the public's level of interest.

These trial tours may lead to a future broadening of this program as was done at Hanford. SRS Completes Neptunium Work to Support NASA Missions

The last of the neptunium inventory at SRS has been successfully stabilized, providing a source for power that is expected to satisfy the needs of the nation's space program for the next 20-30 years. The last of this neptunium – which also represents the last of the United States' neptunium inventory – has been safely and successfully converted from a liquid into a more stable powder form and will be shipped to the Idaho National Laboratory (INL). It will be loaded as a target into reactors at INL and Oak Ridge to produce plutonium-238, which will be used in NASA's deep space probes.

SRNL Employee to Serve on International Energy Project

David Babineau from Savannah River National Laboratory (SRNL) has been selected to serve as the Tritium Plant Responsible Officer for the ITER project, in Cadarache, France. ITER is a major international research project with the goal of demonstrating the scientific and technological feasibility of fusion energy.

The U.S. is one of seven partners in the project, along with China, the European Union, India, Japan, Russia, and South Korea. Under the auspices of the U.S. ITER Project Office, SRNL is a partner laboratory in the project, using its decades of tritium expertise to lead the design, fabrication, assembly and testing of the Tokamak Exhaust Processing (TEP) system. The TEP system will separate hydrogen isotopes from the exhaust stream of the Tokamak, the giant "machine" that creates the fusion reaction – the combining of two isotopes of hydrogen (deuterium and tritium) to form helium – a critical element in the ITER project.

SRS Employees Reach Safe Hours Milestone

Bechtel Savannah River Inc. (BSRI) construction employees at SRS reached a record-setting 22 million safe hours of work on January 20, 2009. The WSRC Team, of which BSRI is a member, manages the contract for liquid waste disposition at the Site. The last lost-time injury for any BSRI construction employee occurred more than 10 years ago, in June 1998.

Liquid Waste projects managed by the Washington Savannah River Company (WSRC) have now marked 9 million safe hours of operation. The 9 million safe hours tally began in March 2006; the last time there was an injury in liquid waste facilities that caused an employee to miss a day of work.

SRSEA UPDATE

As a result of its new name, the Savannah River Site Employee Association (SRSEA) will be issuing new SRSEA cards to replace the old ORA cards. SRSEA will have a table set up at the SRSRA Annual Meeting to be held on April 14. These new cards will be available for all who attend this meeting. SRSEA is working on a

method to distribute the cards to those who are not able to attend the annual meeting. That will be communicated at a later time.

SRSEA is also working on increasing the discount opportunities for its members. SRSEA is working on revamping its website and once that is complete, several new companies are expected to be added to the list. In the meantime, the current list of discounts available can be viewed at the website: www.srsea.com.
