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Chairman's Letter

The Annual Meeting was a success thanks to our great keynote speaker Dr. Ralph DiSibio, President, Washington Energy and Environment. We also had good representation and participation from our Congressional Representatives. Pension Adjustment Committee Chairman Tom Greene presented plaques to Senator Lindsey Graham and Bob Pedde, WSRC President, for their support of the 2002 pension adjustment. Because the Senate was in session, Senator Graham could not be with us; but he was well represented by Rene Anne Tewkesbury who read a letter from him. Because Rene Anne often interfaced with the Board and was instrumental in arranging our meetings with her boss (then Representative Graham), the Board was delighted to have her accept the plaque on his behalf. (The Senator himself has subsequently responded with a written thank you to the Board.) Representative Joe Wilson had to cancel his attendance at the last minute to attend a blessed event, the birth of his first grandson. (Congratulations Congressman Wilson and family!) However, he did send a letter and two members of his Staff to represent him. Your Board will initiate follow-up contacts for future meetings with Senator Graham as well as Representatives Barrett, Norwood, and Wilson.

Your BOD has arranged a meeting with Mr. Jeff Allison, the newly appointed DOE Director at SRS. Mr. Allison has accepted our invitation and will attend the July 1, 2003, Board of Directors meeting.

Your Chairman attended and made a presentation in support of the pending SRS MOX facility at a Nuclear Regulatory Commission Public Hearing. The term "pending" is appropriate since DOE recently announced plans to go ahead with the project.

Summer is upon us, but your Board agenda is continuing. Your Pension Adjustment Committee met recently to establish criteria and a path forward for initiating the next pension adjustment action. Look in this newsletter for Health Benefits Committee activities. We need input from Retirees documenting your trials and tribulations

in dealing with Blue Cross and Blue Shield. In the near future, we plan to sit down with a WSRC Human Resources contact to discuss specific cases. Those of us on Medicare seem to experience ongoing problems reconciling Medicare and Blue Cross/Blue Shield statements.

In closing I urge you to become involved in the SRSRA, it is your organization WE NEED YOUR HELP and participation as the BOD refocuses our program. It was a pleasure to see the newly elected Board Members at the April BOD meeting. Please plan to attend the BOD meetings which are typically held the first Tuesday of each month at the Aiken Knights of Columbus off Daugherty Road. Meeting dates are shifted (infrequently) to accommodate holidays and other conflicts. Call your Chairman or any BOD Member to confirm the meeting date and place.

Pension Adjustment News

The Pension Committee has been exploring various alternatives for pursuing future pension adjustment requests. As a result of this review, the Committee is developing a recommended strategy to present to the SRSRA Board of Directors for their consideration. When this strategy is fully developed by the committee, it will be reviewed and submitted for approval to your Board of Directors.

Notes from the Annual Meeting

SRSRA Chairman, Dave Cowfer, welcomed all in attendance and called the meeting to order at 1:00 P.M. on March 11, 2003.

- I. A spokesperson from Representative Gresham Barrett's office expressed the Congressman's regrets that he could not be at the meeting, but noted he has an Aiken office at 233 Pendleton Street and he would be available to us at that location. The phone number is 803-649-5571. (His mailing address is P.O. Box 1042 Aiken, SC 29802.)
- II. Representative Joe Wilson sent his regrets. He had intended to be present at the meeting, but the House is in session and his first grandson is being born today! He is very positive about SRS and looks forward to working with the local congressional delegation and the SRS Retiree Association.
- III. Rene Ann Tewkesbury explained that the Senate was also in session and read a letter from Senator Lindsey Graham that expressed his opinion that the Site's outlook is bright; he is optimistic about the MOX Plant; we have the support of the Bush administration; the modern PIT facility also looks good; hydrogen research at the site shows potential; and Senator Graham will work with the SRS delegation on development of an energy park and a new generation of reactors at the site.

- IV. Tom Greene took the podium to present plaques expressing the SRSRA's appreciation to both WSRC President Bob Pedde and Senator Lindsey Graham for their support of the members and the objectives of the SRSRA. In accepting his plaque, Mr. Pedde noted that the "retirees and the Site are truly a partnership." He noted the need for good community support for the Site and said he looks forward to continuing to work with the SRSRA. Rene Ann Tewkesbury accepted Senator Graham's plaque on his behalf and said it would be proudly displayed on the wall of the Columbia office.
- ✓ Tom Greene, as Chairman of the SRSRA Pension Committee, recognized the other members of the team—Bill Quinn, Fred Cavanaugh, Bob Stokes, Gorman Ridgely, Paul Cook, and Pat Walker—and thanked them for their efforts on behalf of all WSRC retirees.
- V. Aiken Mayor and SRSRA member Fred Cavanaugh introduced the meeting's keynote speaker, Dr. Ralph R. DiSibio, President, Washington Energy & Environment. Dr. DiSibio opened his presentation with a story about the first time he met Senator Lindsey Graham. He was ushered into the then Congressman's office and the first words out of Mr. Graham's mouth were "we need \$5,000,000 for the retirees" (referring to funding for a pension increase).
- ✓ Dr. DiSibio continued by telling us some details about Washington Group International. The corporation employs 30,000 people in 30 countries. The Energy & Environment division, to which WSRC belongs, is the most profitable division in the company; and SRS is "the jewel in the crown of E&E." The total Site population is currently 13,371 with WSRC making up 11,730 of that figure. SRS is the safest site in the DOE Complex.
 - ✓ The faster this Site and other sites in the DOE Complex close and clean up current projects, the more funding that will be available for new missions. "Closure opens the door to the future of SRS." Such closures prove just how good SRS is. New missions can be funded with money saved by closing old projects at SRS and at other sites that have major project closeouts planned. So, "tell everyone you know how good you were, how good we are, and how good we're going to be."
 - ✓ Responding to a question about how the DOE looks at community support when they are deciding where a new project will go, Dr. DiSibio replied there are 2 major factors: political will and community support. (He said infrastructure also plays a part, but to a lesser degree.) The DOE does not go where it is not wanted!
 - ✓ Another retiree wondered how SRS funding might be impacted by what's happening in Iraq. Dr. DiSibio did not think war with Iraq would have anything to do with SRS funding and, in fact, believes it might cause the U.S. to rethink tritium and rethink weapons.

Fred Cavanaugh expressed the SRSRA's appreciation to Dr. DiSibio for his presentation and gave him a City of Aiken medallion as a token of thanks.

- VI. Dave Cowfer presented the State of the Association:
- ✓ There are 564 paid members of the SRSRA
 - ✓ 1,100 eligible people received a pension adjustment in September 2002
 - ✓ The SRSRA provided written and verbal support for SRS regarding budget and new missions

- ✓ The SRSRA offered technical expertise to the then Governor Hodges on the plutonium issue and other site issues
- ✓ The SRSRA is used as a sounding board to resolve member's benefits issues
- ✓ The SRSRA contacted other retiree organizations in the DOE Complex to create a coalition
- ✓ Annual physical exams are still offered. The Site Plan authorizes Blue Cross/Blue Shield \$250 to pay for the physicals.

The Chairman then discussed several items the association is considering as it refocuses its agenda for future actions:

- ✓ Health Benefits – retaining the benefits we have, monitoring payments made by Medicare and Blue Cross to various members to see if payments are uniform
- ✓ Forming a coalition with other sites to compare pension benefits and health benefits
- ✓ Public Relations – should we advertise SRSRA positions on politically sensitive issues?
- ✓ New members – all current members need to urge new retirees to join – give their names and addresses to the Board of Directors so they can be contacted
- ✓ Travel – is the SRSRA interested in exploring group rates and group trips for members?

VII. Stan Smith presented the Treasurer's Report. The Association's fiscal year runs from July through June, but Stan presented a current look at the financial status.

VIII. Gerry Croom explained the proposed Bylaws Amendment, which would eliminate the Executive Committee and transfer all of its power to the Board of Directors. The amendment passed by voice vote.

IX. Bob Stokes discussed the SRSRA Pension Increase Program. Bob stated "we asked for a pension adjustment similar to DuPont's and Oak Ridge's raises." The increase was based on the Consumer Price Index and it was intended to return 50% of the retirees' lost buying power. Bob calculated that most people got a return of 40 to 49%.

- ✓ The increase applied to those people who retired after March 1989 and before May 1999. 1,100 people benefited from the increase. Surviving spouses were included in the pension increase (although the Site was originally going to omit them). The total yearly cost of the pension adjustment is estimated at \$1,000,000.

- ✓ Retirees classified as “Deferred Vested” did not receive the pension adjustment. Deferred Vested employees are those people with less than 15 years of service at the time of their retirement. This exclusion is common in the commercial world, too. At SRS, the biggest group of Deferred Vested retirees are retire/rehires from DuPont. These people spent a great deal of their work time working at the Site. Therefore, the Pension Committee will address the issue of pension increases for them in future pension increase requests.
- ✓ Also, in 1993 and 1995 special offers (“early retirement incentives”) were made to reduce the Site population; and although the retire/rehire employees accepting ERI’s did receive early pensions, they are still considered “deferred vested”. The number of “deferred vested” retirees at SRS is larger than at other sites because of the DuPont/Westinghouse transition. Your SRSRA Pension Committee thinks that retirees who received their pension because of an ERI Program also deserve an increase.
- ✓ Hopefully, after the first of 2004, we will go back for an increase that will also include the deferred vested retirees.

X. The final item on the agenda was the election of the Board of Directors for a term of two years. Nick Kuehn presented the proposed slate of candidates, and it was unanimously accepted by a voice vote.

Elected for two-year term – Art Blanchard, Fred Cavanaugh, George Duke, James Fuqua, Tom Greene, Chuck Hyatt, Paul Katonak, Warren Kenrick, Nick Kuehn, Thomas Moore, Jim Morrison, Ray Perks, Bill Quinn, Charles Riley and Chuck Seitter.

Elected to complete a one-year term - Art Hadden.

Other Board members still serving the remainder of their two year term: Dave Cowfer, John Church, Bob Stokes, Mike French, Dick Barclay, Sid Curry, Jim Gibbons, John Jones, Frank Langford, Stan Smith, Sam Goforth, Al Hunter, Tom Hendrix, and Harry Ledbetter.

Dave Cowfer adjourned the meeting at 3:00 P.M.

WSRC New Safety Record

On Wednesday, March 5, the WSRC added to its long record of safety accomplishment. That day marked 10 million man-hours worked by WSRC operations employees without injury resulting in a lost workday. This is the third time in less than three years that WSRC employees have surpassed that milestone. WSRC President Bob Pedde indicated that staying injury-free is a daily effort and the continuous excellent safety performance is the key element that makes SRS a leader in the industry. SRSRA sends our congratulations to WSRC for adding to its long record of safety accomplishment. (A lost workday case is defined as any work-related injury or illness which results in days away from work. WSRC continues to retain STAR status, the highest award in the DOE's Voluntary Protection Program for Safety Excellence.)

New DWPF Melter Begins Operations

The Site's Defense Waste Processing Facility has begun radioactive operations with its second melter, which was installed during a successful 6-month outage. The 65-ton melter, the heart of DWPF operations, was installed in January. This was followed by startup tests and a gradual heat-up. The new melter began pouring radioactive glass on March 29, and the first canister was completed the following day. The outage was completed 3 weeks ahead of schedule. A lot of additional work was done that would otherwise have required an additional outage in the future (hence, saving significant taxpayers money).

One major task that was undertaken during this outage, rather than in a future one, was to replace the facility's control room equipment with a more modern Distributed Control System. The previous system was 1980's vintage, and replacement parts were no longer available. Other obsolete equipment was also replaced in this outage, making it more viable for its long term operation.

DWPF's first melter operated continuously for more than 8 years, including 6 years of radioactive operations – more than three times its design life. It produced more than 1300 waste glass canisters, about 27% of the projected total for DWPF. The plan was to operate the first melter for as long as possible, giving engineers a chance to observe how it can falter in its later life and what to look for in future melter operations. By extending the original melter's useful life, SRS saved millions in taxpayers dollars and stayed on course to empty waste tanks. (Melters cost approximately \$20 million each.)

SRS Achieves Milestone in Waste Removal

On April 14, the Site achieved another major milestone in the removal of waste from the State of South Carolina, when it released its 100th shipment of transuranic waste (TRU) to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) in Carlsbad, New Mexico. In recent months, the Site has dramatically accelerated the rate at which this waste is shipped to WIPP, reaching its 100th shipment approximately 6 years ahead of its originally scheduled date. At this rate, the Site will complete shipping these wastes to New Mexico approximately 20 years ahead of schedule. Originally, the Site was making shipments at a rate of about one per month. Currently, the Site is making approximately 16 shipments per month. By the end of 2003, WSRC expects to surpass the number of shipments originally scheduled through 2014. Overall, the accelerated schedule will mean that all the currently stored TRU waste at SRS is planned to be transported and disposed of at WIPP by 2014 instead of 2034!

(WIPP is a government-owned geologic repository constructed for the safe permanent disposal of transuranic waste (TRU). TRU waste consists of clothing, rags, tools, residues, debris and other items contaminated with small quantities of radioactive elements heavier than uranium. SRS TRU waste primarily includes items with trace amounts of plutonium. Approximately 11,000 cubic meters of TRU waste are stored at SRS.)

L Area Seepage basin Closure Marks Another SRS Milestone

The last step in closing one of SRS's reactor seepage basins has been completed, marking a milestone for environmental remediation activities at the Site. A protective soil cover, the final step in remediating the basin, was completed at the L Area Reactor Seepage Basin in April. This is one of several reactor seepage basins being closed under one Record of Decision. The process was begun in October 2002. Remediation consisted of several engineered measures: First, workers removed and chipped the vegetation at the basin, then backfilled the basin with common soil. Next, they placed a 2-foot layer of low permeability soil into the basin, and finally came a layer of vegetative soil, which was covered with sod. This remedy will prevent rainwater intrusion and limit migration of radioactive metal contaminants into the groundwater. The unlined earthen basin, located outside L Area's reactor building, measures approximately 200-feet long by 36-feet wide by 7-feet deep. During reactor operations, it received contaminated purge water from the reactor and liquid waste from tanker trucks.

Another Reduction in Force at SRS

In a recent letter to employees, WSRC President Bob Pedde described the status of future staffing actions. Staffing Reviews have been completed in both the President's Office and Business Units; and as expected, additional skill mix issues were identified. As a result, there will be a reduction in force of less than 60 persons which will take place in late April. This is a continuation of efforts by WSRC to establish the required skill mix to accomplish current missions. In addition, there has been a continued redeployment of a significant number of people to critical direct project work

Bob went on to say that "while the new organization is in place and initial staffing reviews are complete, I want to remind everyone that we will need to continue to evaluate staffing needs as mission changes occur. Our funding levels for the next several years are actually projected to increase to support accelerated cleanup. As such, I expect we will continue to hire on a selected basis as needs evolve. While no major reductions are anticipated, 'ebb and flow' type skill mix adjustments may still be necessary as requirements and/or missions change."

Limited Service Employee (LSE) Opportunities

We are working with WSRC management to implement an LSE program for retirees willing and able to work at the site. The site is still assessing their supplemental employment needs and we will alert those of you who have expressed an interest in this type of work as soon as those needs are finalized. If you are interested in LSE work, provide a cover letter and two copies of your resume to the SRSRA. One copy of your resume' will be forwarded to the SRS human resources office and one copy will be retained by the SRSRA. Submit that information to the address at the top of this page, Attention: Mike French.
