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## **SRSRA ANNUAL MEETING – MARCH 9, 2004**

Dave Cowfer, SRSRA Chairman, called the 2004 Annual Meeting to order at 1:00 P.M. on March 9, 2004. Dave recognized Rene Ann Tewkesberry representing Senator Lindsey Graham; Ginny Allen representing Congressman Gresham Barrett; Jim Hussey representing Senator Saxby Chambliss; Kathleen Black representing Congressman Charlie Norwood; and Nancy Bobbitt representing Congressman Max Burns. Dave also thanked representatives from The Aiken Standard, The Augusta Chronicle, and Channel 6 for attending the session and covering the meeting for the news media.

He proceeded to read a letter from Senator Graham who sent his regrets at being unable to attend the meeting, but wanted us to know that he envisions new missions for the site and takes pride in representing SRS, “the jewel of the DOE complex”. Dave followed with a letter from Congressman Barrett who also regretted that business in Washington prevented his being with us. He wanted the Association to know that, while layoffs appear to be unavoidable at this time, his office will be available to look for ways those layoffs can be minimized. He said that seeking new missions for SRS is at the top of his agenda, and he is confident the site will be selected for future work because he knows “SRS is the best facility in the nation – in the world!”

Jim Hussey spoke for Senator Chambliss and wanted the retirees to know that the Senator will be opening an Augusta office next month in the same area as Congressman Norwood’s office. Senator Chambliss is concerned with DOE and SRS activities and will be looking for input if there is anything he can do to help us.

Speaking for Congressman Norwood, Kathleen Black read a letter thanking retirees for their years of dedication and service given to SRS and the nation. Congressman Norwood wanted retirees to know that their issues are important to him. Referring to the recent Medicare Prescription Bill, he said “we went about trying to do the right thing the wrong way.” He feels certain parts of the bill are worthwhile (like the option for health savings accounts), but “if you are in Medicare and are not interested in any of the enhancements, you are free to stick with what you’ve got.” He concluded his letter with an invitation to “let me know if I can be of assistance in the future.”

Nancy Bobbitt conveyed Congressman Max Burns' regrets at not being able to attend the meeting and sent his best wishes to the retirees.

Fred Cavanaugh handled the introductions for our Keynote Speaker, Jeff Allison, Manager of DOE SROO, and honored guest, Robert Pedde, President of WSRC. Fred noted that Mr. Allison holds a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from Princeton and had been Acting Assistant Manager of High Level Waste before being appointed Manager of Savannah River Operations Office in March 2003. Mr. Pedde is a Michigan State University graduate and has 30 years of experience in the nuclear field. He was Executive Vice President of WSRC prior to being named President in August 2001. Both gentlemen were warmly received by the retirees.

Mr. Allison began by thanking retirees for helping to educate other members of the community about "what we do and what we're all about." He said community support is vital and laughed when he said his 8 years in Hanford taught him that. Mr. Allison says it costs \$800 million a year "just to show up at SRS" and maintain the facility. He hopes to reduce that figure "by a couple hundred million".

A chart showed the SRS Budget Summary for the past, current, and next year:

While closure of Environmental Restoration and Waste Management projects are sure, he is optimistic for missions that will, among other things, Recycle and Extract Tritium, Stabilize and Store Plutonium; Disassemble and Convert Plutonium Pits; and Blend Down Highly Enriched Uranium for Commercial Use.

Mr. Allison praised the Injury and Illness Ranking of SRS. It is No. 1 within the DOE Complex, ranking as the safest of 15 DOE facilities on a chart he displayed.

He closed his presentation with comments about historic preservation at the Site. The DOE is presently working with CAB, CNTA, the City of Augusta, and the SC State Historical Office among others to locate artifacts and identify locations that should be preserved. He noted the Site has many buildings over 50 years old. He asked the retirees for their assistance in providing oral histories as well as helping identify those objects and locations at SRS which are historically worthy.

There were no questions from the audience at the conclusion of Mr. Allison's presentation, and Fred Cavanaugh thanked him on behalf of the Association and presented him with an Aiken Medallion of the Old Post Office as a token of appreciation.

Mr. Pedde began his remarks by assuring the retirees "you are a vital part of our interface with the community". He noted that 2003 accomplishments included addressing risk issues and moving waste off of the site.

He explained the current workforce restructuring is necessitated because of skill mix issues; old missions are completed and new missions require changes. An Involuntary Workforce Reduction that involves 300 positions is now in progress. There has been significant movement of personnel between projects. Workforce flexibility is the key to current mission success.

Looking to the future, Mr. Pedde sees a role for SRS in nuclear power. Dominion Power is currently working with the Site on nuclear energy programs and a power reactor to be located at SRS. A consortium of 24 universities has agreed that SRS will be the location of a "teaching" reactor. The Site is working with the University of South Carolina to establish a new Hydrogen Lab. (There are more hydrogen experts at SRS than anywhere in the nation.) The Site has furnished a robot that was sent to Iraq to identify road-side bombs. SRS is working with the U. S. Coast Guard to identify and track materials coming into the United States and wants to build a forensic lab in conjunction with the FBI that would investigate nuclear materials such as "dirty" bombs.

Mr. Pedde concluded his remarks noting that Environmental Management will come to an end over the next 20 years; but if the DOE recognizes we can complete missions on time and on schedule, future missions will come to us. He then offered to respond to questions from the audience.

Nick Kuehn referred to the February 6, 2004, SRSRA Board of Directors meeting Mr. Pedde had attended and his comment at that time that he (Mr. Pedde) did not support changing our prescription drug coverage when the new Medicare prescription plan goes into effect in 2006. To confirm that position, Nick asked: "You plan to keep the same prescription drug plan?" Mr. Pedde said, "We have no plans to make any changes."

Mr. Cavanaugh expressed the Association's thanks to Mr. Pedde and also presented him with a City of Aiken Post Office Medallion. Fred also thanked Mr. Allison and Mr. Pedde for their leadership at the Site and their partnership in working with the Association. He assured them the Association is always willing to help and support the Site whenever possible.

James N. Kirr, Site Manager of the Energy Employees Compensation Center in North Augusta, was next on the agenda. He informed the retirees that the Energy Employees Compensation program has awarded in excess of \$10-1/2M thus far to SRS employees or their survivors whose cancer was traced to their employment at the site. There is still concern that some employees may not be aware they were exposed to beryllium. If you worked in any of the following areas, you could have been exposed to beryllium: 321M, the 773A Hot Shop, 105K Reactor, the F Area Lab, or the Central Shops Machine Shop. If you worked in any of these areas, or you are experiencing breathing problems, you can call the Energy Employees Compensation Resource Center at 803-279-2728 (or toll free at 1-866-666-4606) for a free health screening.

Dave Cowfer introduced Stan Smith who presented the Treasurer's Report through February. (An updated Treasurer's Report through April is presented later in this Newsletter.)

Dave Cowfer's State of the Association report was next on the agenda. Dave began by discussing the Board of Directors' key activities during the past year:

- A position paper has been developed on future pension increases. In meetings with Mr. Pedde, your Board of Directors proposed that the Site consider tri-annual increases for retirees' pensions. Since the last increase took 4 years to accomplish, your BOD felt it was appropriate to begin a dialog on this matter now. (We hope to be able to include people, who were excluded in the recent increase, the next time an adjustment is made.)

- The Association lobbied against the Medicare Prescription Drug Bill. We interfaced with our local Congressional Delegation; sent Letters to the Editors of The Aiken Standard, The Augusta Chronicle, The State, and the USA Today; and can report that all but one of the local delegation voted against the bill.
- We held mutually beneficial meetings with Mr. Bob Pedde and Mr. Jeff Allison. Both gentlemen agreed we are the voice of experience for both DOE and Site Management. Because of the changing demographics of the CSRA (many new retired persons arriving and new corporations bringing employees into the area), we need to use our experience to articulate the Site's safety culture and history to new arrivals.
- We participated in public meetings in support of SRS Missions and encourage all members to attend such sessions in the future and speak out on their support for the Site.
- We continued our contact with other retiree organizations in the DOE complex; we regularly get reports on Oak Ridge activities. Mr. Allison has informed us that a DOE Legacy Management group has been formed to look at the inconsistencies in benefits throughout the DOE complex. (We will follow this issue with DOE and our Congressional Delegation.)
- We have provided support in resolving member benefit issues. We are trying to build a library of problems and solutions that members will be able to access. (There seems to be a disconnect whenever Medicare sends paperwork to Blue Cross/Blue Shield; paperwork often seems to get lost or not be received by BC/BS.)
- We have tried to provide good communication to the membership with our Newsletters.

Concerning SRSRA Membership, Dave made the following points:

- We are the largest registered South Carolina Retiree Association. Paid membership prior to the March 9 meeting was 490.
- Because it is difficult to locate retirees and because a larger organization will benefit all retirees, the BOD is asking you to recruit two retirees for the association during the coming year.
- The BOD approved a free year of membership for 2004 retirees. Mr. Pedde has agreed to include this offer and our membership form in the exit package of information retiring employees receive.

Dave suggested all retirees can do the following:

- Continue to support site missions and be the voice of experience in the community.
- If you are interested in ad hoc work assignments, plan to contact Global Energy Services for assignments of varying length all over the world, or contact ACTS in New Ellenton for short term work at the Site.
- When you call in a prescription to a pharmacy, pick up the prescription in a timely manner. (Retirees and current employees had developed a habit of calling in prescriptions, but not picking them up. Blue Cross/Blue Shield mailed checks to these people for prescriptions never picked up. The amount of overpayment was in six figures. This money had to be recouped. Because of this, reimbursement for

prescriptions is now delayed from the previous 5 days to 14 days after the prescription is filled. Please help us maintain the good prescription drug reimbursement system we currently have in place.)

- Assist with the historic preservation of the Site by providing oral histories and recommendations on artifacts and locations that should be preserved.
- Increase retiree visibility by volunteering for the Site's Speakers Bureau.
- Read your Newsletter; stay informed.

Jim Morrison handled the final item on the meeting's agenda—the election of Board of Directors members for the coming year. As SRSRA members know, the Board consists of 30 members who serve 2-year terms. Half of the Board (15 members) are elected each year at the Annual Meeting. The proposed slate was elected by unanimous voice vote; no nominations were made from the floor. The following 10 incumbents were elected to another 2-year term: John Church, Dave Cowfer, Sid Curry, Mike French, Sam Goforth, Al Hunter, Francis Langford, Harry Ledbetter, Stan Smith, and Bob Stokes. And, the following 5 new members were elected: Randy Clarke, Carl Hirst, Charlie Miller, John Pickett, and Leo Zimmerman.

Dave Cowfer adjourned the 2004 Annual Meeting at approximately 3:00 P.M.

These gentlemen were approved by the Board unanimously by voice vote.

In addition, the new BOD members are: Randy Clark, Carl Hirst, Charlie Miller, John Pickett, and Leo Zimmerman. We all welcome them. Dave Cowfer agreed to devote his time, energy, and leadership for another year as Chairman. We all owe him a debt of gratitude for his service to SRSRA. Bob Stokes agreed to take on the role of Membership Chairman with continuing, valuable support from Ray Perks, the outgoing Membership Chairman. Bob and Pat Stokes will continue to be Co-Editors of the SRSRA Newsletter.

(Tel: 706-792-5075) The phone number is also included regularly in the benefits contacts list. **You should retain the contacts list for future reference.** The cost for the service is your co-pay amount, with BC/BS paying the rest. **You should not receive any additional charges for a routine physical.**

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### Medical Benefits Issue:

As announced in the previous issue of this newsletter, Judy Martin and Linda Clemmer, the Blue Cross/Blue Shield Customer Service Representatives for Major Group contracts, came to the recent SRSRA Annual Meeting specifically to help our members who have been having difficulties in getting proper reimbursement from BC/BS for their medical expenses. Our members brought copies of their paperwork to give Judy and Linda who got all the information needed to resolve these problems.

This procedure was very successful, and as a result Judy Martin has offered to come to Aiken again for a day devoted specifically to resolving BC/BS reimbursement problems. This day will have an added enhancement, in that she will bring her laptop computer with her and use it to connect to the BC/BS internet site to resolve members' problems immediately.

No specific date or location has yet been set for this because we need to get some indication if members are interested in attending such an event. If you are interested, please send your name, e-mail and snail mail

## MEDICARE ISSUES AND INFORMATION

Carolina Medical Review (CMR) is the Quality Improvement Organization for South Carolina's Medicare program. They are "funded by the federal Medicare program to ensure that Medicare beneficiaries in the Palmetto State receive quality healthcare."

They evaluate the performance of Medicare and also rate nursing homes and hospitals. They have a variety of useful information, including a quarterly newsletter, "Health Wise", available either at their web site (<http://www.MRNC.org>) or by calling 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227).

There is a QIO in every state, and that listing is at: <http://www.medqic.org/content/qio/qio.jsp?pageID=4>

The QIO can help with concerns such as quality of medical care, early hospital discharges, and making choices with nursing homes and home health agencies.

For members having trouble with Medicare coverage in other states, it would be better to contact Medicare directly at the national 24-hour customer service number, **1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227)**. Members on the Internet can also visit <http://www.medicare.gov>. If members have a state-specific question, the customer service representative at that number should be able to refer members to the state-specific Medicare number. (For example, **the one for South Carolina is 1-800-583-2236.**)

This may be a useful starting contact to resolve Medicare issues if the regular Medicare office of your state is not providing satisfactory service.

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## **SRS Activities**

### **SRTC Certified as the new Savannah River National Laboratory (SRNL)**

During a visit to SRS on May 7, Secretary of Energy Spencer Abraham certified SRTC as the new National Laboratory – SRNL. Secretary Abraham was joined by Governor Mark Sanford and Congressmen Gresham Barrett and Max Burns. Senator Lindsey Graham was unable to attend because of commitments in Washington. Noting Sen. Graham’s decade of work on this issue, Gov. Sanford said he felt the announcement honored the “absolutely great workforce here at SRS”. In a taped message, Sen. Graham said that SRTC being designated as a National Laboratory means the world to SRS. This is a historic event because it is like going from single A baseball to the World Series in terms of research opportunities and new missions for the SRS.

During his presentation, Secretary Abraham said that President Bush and he are proud of the scientific and technical work ongoing at DOE’s National Laboratories. “Today we are even more proud to designate this new laboratory – the 12th. - and make it a full partner in the critical missions performed by DOE facilities. Furthermore, today’s designation makes official what many have known for a long time, that SRTC has been functioning as a National laboratory in everything but name!”

Today, SRNL has an annual operating budget of \$132 million, the majority devoted to DOE EM and NNSA projects. Other projects include work for the U.S. Army, NRC, EPA, and IAEA.

### **WSRC Workforce Restructuring**

In our last Newsletter edition, we reported that an “approved” workforce restructuring plan called for some 300 WSRC employees to be laid off in the coming months. In a May 3rd announcement, WSRC President Bob Pedde indicated that, after completing its review, DOE had approved only a portion of the proposed workforce restructuring request. Specifically, DOE approved the release of those persons who had chosen to volunteer. WSRC and DOE did not reach agreement on other elements of the proposed plan. Because of the “disruption” to employees that this lengthy process has caused, WSRC has decided not to pursue this restructuring plan any further in FY-04. This is good news for employees as well as communities around the CSRA.

### **SRS’s Six-Pack Demolition Project Beats Fast-Track Schedule.**

With the completed demolition of the 320-M Alloy Manufacturing Facility in early March, SRS workers have met the challenge of safely demolishing six M Area facilities in less than 18 months. The project was actually completed a month ahead of schedule. This has been the biggest D&D project ever undertaken at SRS. M Area was historically the beginning of the “production process” at SRS. All operations have been shut down since the late 1980’s. In addition, transfer of nuclear materials stored in M-Area buildings were made to Envirocare of Utah for disposal. More than 150 shipments were completed ahead of schedule. The remainder of M Area is scheduled to be razed by the end of 2006.

### **WSRC and USC Sign Research Collaboration Agreement**

On March 30, the University of South. Carolina (USC) and WSRC signed a strategic Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that will allow the two institutions to share resources and to expand significantly on past collaborative research, joint funding proposals, exchange of researchers and teaching activities. In the

agreement signed by USC President Dr. Andrew Sorensen and SRNL Director Dr. Todd Wright, the research organizations pledge to develop a strong research partnership program in a number of targeted areas, including hydrogen research, fuel cells, bio-defense, and environmental research. These targeted areas build on existing complementary strengths at the two organizations.
